John Muir

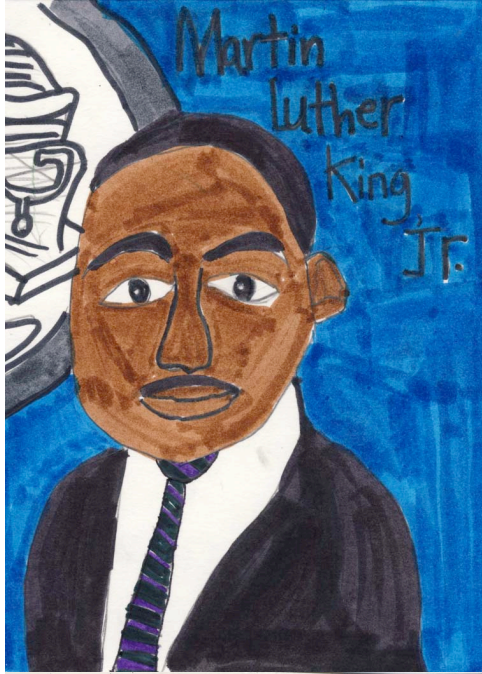
1838 - 1914

1913 - 1980

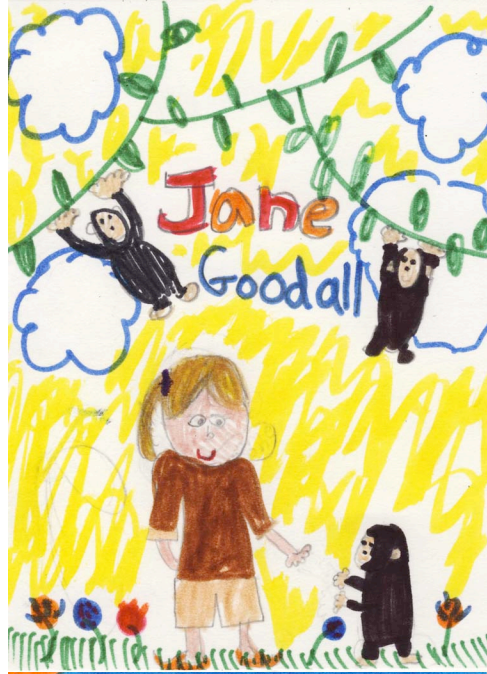
Jesse Owens made a difference because he thought that Black athletes could be as good as White athletes and Jesse proved the Whites who didn't believe it wrong.



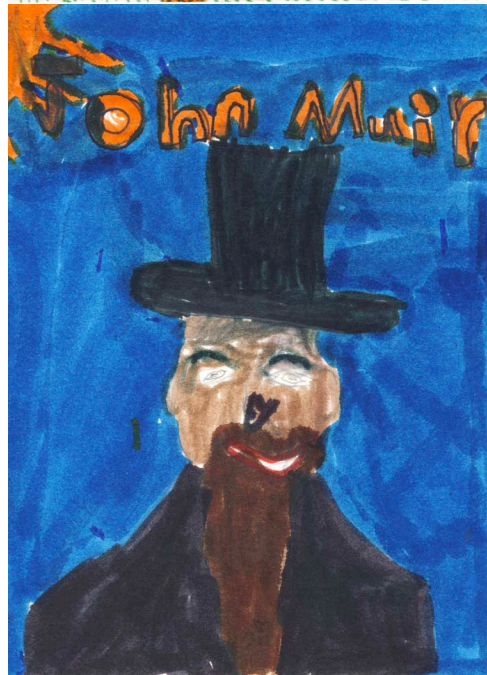

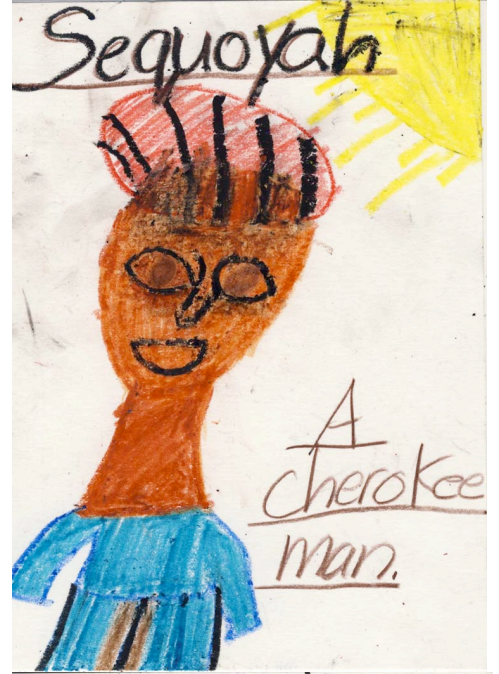

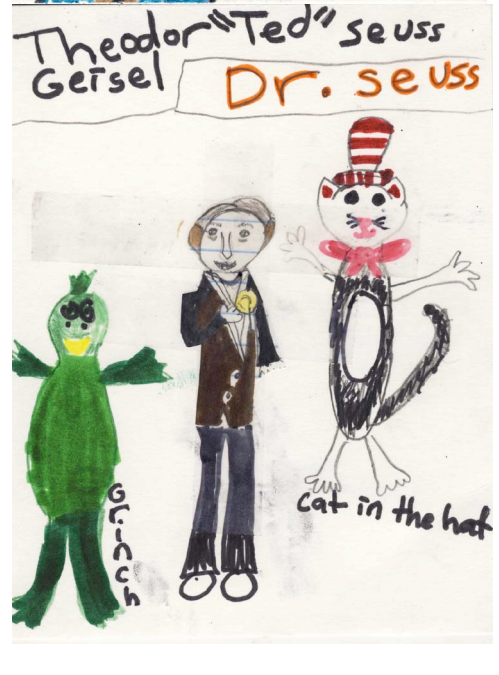

Louis Pasteur

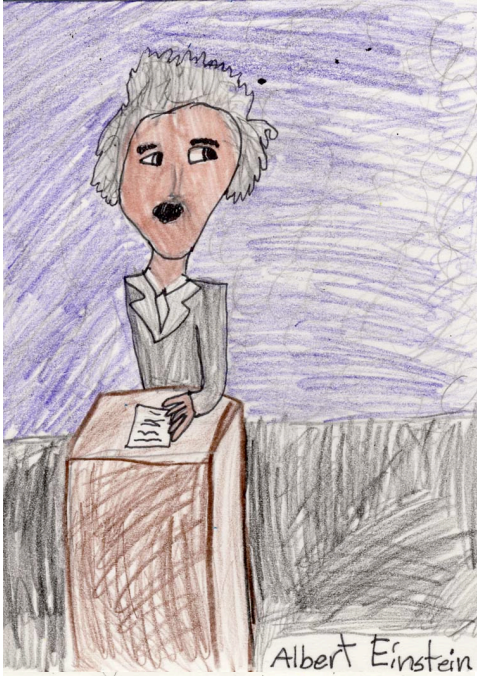
1822 -1895

1930 - present

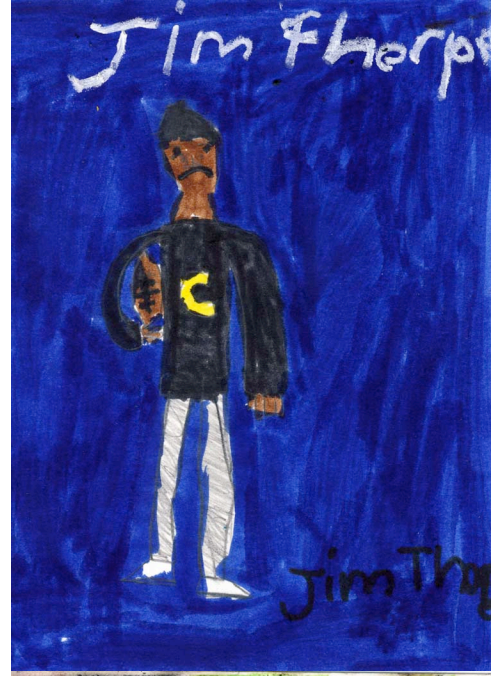
Neil Armstrong made a difference because he was the first person on the Moon. He was the one who proved that astronauts could explore the Moon.

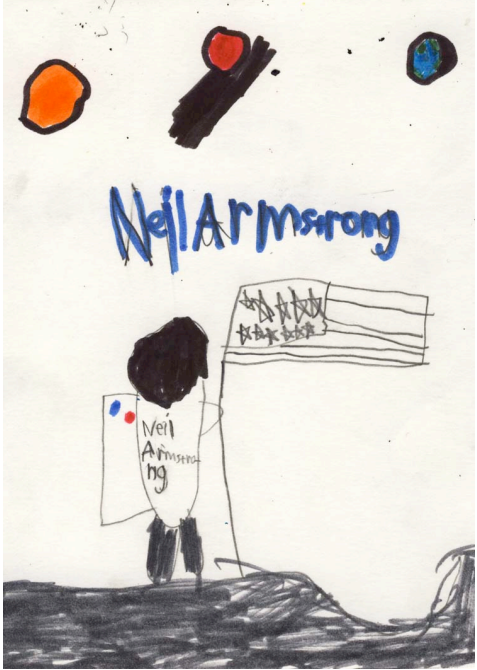

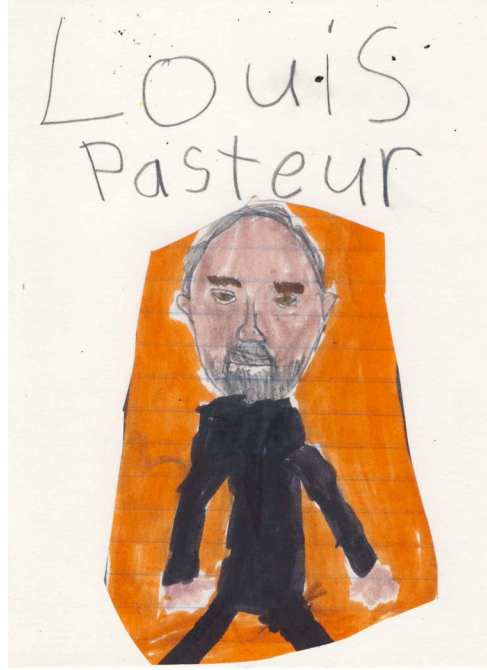

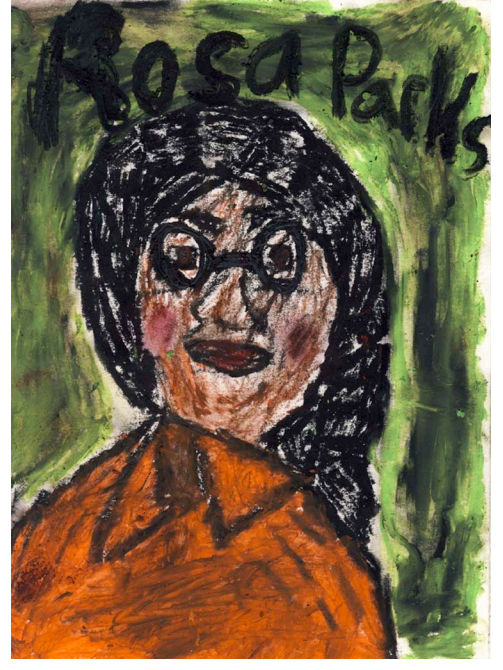
